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### CERTIFICATIONS

Consistency with plan —The housing activities to be undertaken with Community Development Block Grant, HOME, Emergency Solutions Grant, and Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS funds are consistent with the strategic plan in the jurisdiction's consolidated plan.

Section 3 -- It will comply with section 3 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (12 U.S.C. 1701u) and implementing regulations at 24 CFR Part 75.

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Compliance with Anti-discrimination laws - The grant will be conducted and administered in conformity with title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. 2000d) and the Fair Housing Act (42 U.S.C. 3601-3619) and implementing regulations.

Lead-Based Paint - Its activities concerning lead-based paint will comply with the requirements of 24 CFR Part 35, Subparts A, B, J, K and R.

Compliance with Laws -- It will comply with applicable laws.

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### Specific Community Development Block Grant Certifications

The Entitlement Community certifies that:

Citizen Participation — It is in full compliance and following a detailed citizen participation plan that satisfies the requirements of 24 CFR 91.105.

Community Development Plan -- Its consolidated plan identifies community development and housing needs and specifies both short-term and long-term community development objectives that that have been developed in accordance with the primary objective of the CDBG program (i.e., the development of viable urban communities, by providing decent housing and expanding economic opportunities, primarily for persons of low and moderate income) and requirements of 24 CFR Parts 91 and 570.

Following a Plan - It is following a current consolidated plan that has been approved by HUD.

Use of Funds -- It has complied with the following criteria:

- 1. Maximum Feasible Priority. With respect to activities expected to be assisted with CDBG funds, it has developed its Action Plan so as to give maximum feasible priority to activities which benefit low- and moderate-income families or aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight. The Action Plan may also include CDBG-assisted activities which the grantee certifies are designed to meet other community development needs having particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community, and other financial resources are not available (see Optional CDBG Certification).
- 3. Special Assessments. It will not attempt to recover any capital costs of public improvements assisted with CDBG funds, including Section 108 loan guaranteed funds, by assessing any amount against properties owned and occupied by persons of low and moderate income, including any fee charged or assessment made as a condition of obtaining access to such public improvements.

However, if CDBG funds are used to pay the proportion of a fee or assessment that relates to the capital costs of public improvements (assisted in part with CDBG funds) financed from other revenue sources, an assessment or charge may be made against the property with respect to the public improvements financed by a source other than CDBG funds.

In addition, in the case of properties owned and occupied by moderate-income (not low-income) families, an assessment or charge may be made against the property for public improvements financed by a source other than CDBG funds if the jurisdiction certifies that it lacks CDBG funds to cover the assessment.

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### **Emergency Solutions Grants Certifications**

The Emergency Solutions Grants Program recipient certifies that:

Major rehabilitation/conversion/renovation — If an emergency shelter's rehabilitation costs exceed 75 percent of the value of the building before rehabilitation, the recipient will maintain the building as a shelter for homeless individuals and families for a minimum of 10 years after the date the building is first occupied by a homeless individual or family after the completed rehabilitation.

If the cost to convert a building into an emergency shelter exceeds 75 percent of the value of the building after conversion, the recipient will maintain the building as a shelter for homeless individuals and families for a minimum of 10 years after the date the building is first occupied by a homeless individual or family after the completed conversion.

In all other cases where ESG funds are used for renovation, the recipient will maintain the building as a shelter for homeless individuals and families for a minimum of 3 years after the date the building is first occupied by a homeless individual or family after the completed renovation.

Essential Services and Operating Costs — In the case of assistance involving shelter operations or essential services related to street outreach or emergency shelter, the recipient will provide services or shelter to homeless individuals and families for the period during which the ESG assistance is provided, without regard to a particular site or structure, so long the recipient serves the same type of persons (e.g., families with children, unaccompanied youth, disabled individuals, or victims of domestic violence) or persons in the same geographic area.

**Renovation** – Any renovation carried out with ESG assistance shall be sufficient to ensure that the building involved is safe and sanitary.

Supportive Services – The recipient will assist homeless individuals in obtaining permanent housing, appropriate supportive services (including medical and mental health treatment, victim services, counseling, supervision, and other services essential for achieving independent living), and other Federal State, local, and private assistance available for these individuals.

Matching Funds - The recipient will obtain matching amounts required under 24 CFR 576.201.

Confidentiality — The recipient has established and is implementing procedures to ensure the confidentiality of records pertaining to any individual provided family violence prevention or treatment services under any project assisted under the ESG program, including protection against the release of the address or location of any family violence shelter project, except with the written authorization of the person responsible for the operation of that shelter.

Homeless Persons Involvement — To the maximum extent practicable, the recipient will involve, through employment, volunteer services, or otherwise, homeless individuals and families in constructing, renovating, maintaining, and operating facilities assisted under the ESG program, in providing services assisted under the ESG program, and in providing services for occupants of facilities assisted under the program.

### Upper Darby Township ESG Guidelines

The ESG Program provides funding to: (1) engage homeless individuals and families living on the street; (2) improve the number and quality of emergency shelters for homeless individuals and families; (3) help operate homeless shelters; (4) provide essential services to shelter residents; (5) rapidly re-house individuals and families, and (6) prevent individuals and families from becoming homeless.

This Program year Upper Darby will use their ESG funding to improve the quality of an existing shelter by providing funding for shelter renovation. In the future, if ESG funds are received and the Township determines another need for the funding, these Guidelines will be revised to cover that use.

Upper Darby Township will enter a Subrecipient Agreement with a local Non-profit currently operating a shelter to provide funding for the renovation and expansion of the shelter to enable them to provide additional beds for the homeless. All requirements will be clearly spelled out in that Agreement.

Those requirements will include but not be limited to the following:

- -The subrecipient is responsible for providing the full Match to the Grant amount and show that Match in writing.
- -Subrecipient will be required to meet all the ESG regulations outlined in 24CFR Part 576.
- -Subrecipient must provide in writing to the Township a professional property valuation both before renovations begin and post renovation in accordance with Subpart F (k).
- -Subrecipient must have at least one homeless person on their Board as outlined in 24SFR Part 576.405.
- -Subrecipient must have and provide to the Township written Policies and Procedures. These Policies and Procedures must include at a minimum language regarding Conflict of Interest, Anti-discrimination, and procurement. They must also contain their policies for client intake which must be done through the HMIS system. They must include the definition of Homeless as defined in 24CFR 576.2

and also their Financial Management and Record Keeping Procedures and Policies.

- -All Federal Fair Housing requirements must be met and the shelter must be handicap accessible
- -The Homeless shelter being renovated with ESG funds must continue to serve the homeless for a 10-year period following the renovation
- -Subrecipient must provide copies of the inspections done by a certified inspector pre-construction, during construction and post construction.
- -Subrecipient must have a lead-based paint test prior to the start of construction by a State licensed Lead based paint tester and Risk Assessor. If lead paint is found in levels which exceed the EPA Safety Threshold, lead based paint remediation must be completed.
- -Subrecipient must provide copies of the Work Write Up and Specifications used for bidding purposes. The Procurement regulations set forth in 24 CFR Part 200.317. Copies of all procurement documents must be kept in the file and provided to the Township upon request.
- -All Construction bidding and Contracts must include the current Davis Bacon Wage Rates and also the Section 3 Requirements.
- -It is required that all Shelter and Housing Standards as outlined in 24 CFR 576.403 (copy is attached) must be met.

The Township will closely monitor the Subrecipient to ensure that all regulations and requirements are being met.

Invoices must be submitted on a monthly basis and must show details of the work completed and the Match.

### § 576.403 Shelter and housing standards.

- (a) Lead-based paint remediation and disclosure. The Lead-Based Paint Poisoning Prevention Act (42 U.S.C. 4821–4846), the Residential Lead-Based Paint Hazard Reduction Act of 1992 (42 U.S.C. 4851–4856), and implementing regulations in 24 CFR part 35, subparts A, B, H, J, K, M, and R apply to all shelters assisted under ESG program and all housing occupied by program participants.
- (b) Minimum standards for emergency shelters. Any building for which Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds are used for conversion, major rehabilitation, or other renovation, must meet state or local government safety and sanitation standards, as applicable, and the following minimum safety, sanitation, and privacy standards. Any emergency shelter that receives assistance for shelter operations must also meet the following minimum safety, sanitation, and privacy standards. The recipient may also establish standards that exceed or add to these minimum standards.
  - (1) Structure and materials. The shelter building must be structurally sound to protect residents from the elements and not pose any threat to health and safety of the residents. Any renovation (including major rehabilitation and conversion) carried out with ESG assistance must use Energy Star and WaterSense products and appliances.
  - (2) Access. The shelter must be accessible in accordance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act (29 U.S.C. 794) and implementing regulations at 24 CFR part 8; the Fair Housing Act (42 U.S.C. 3601 et seq.) and implementing regulations at 24 CFR part 100; and Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (42 U.S.C. 12131 et seq.) and 28 CFR part 35; where applicable.
  - (3) Space and security. Except where the shelter is intended for day use only, the shelter must provide each program participant in the shelter with an acceptable place to sleep and adequate space and security for themselves and their belongings.
  - (4) Interior air quality. Each room or space within the shelter must have a natural or mechanical means of ventilation. The interior air must be free of pollutants at a level that might threaten or harm the health of residents.
  - (5) Water supply. The shelter's water supply must be free of contamination.

- (6) Sanitary facilities. Each program participant in the shelter must have access to sanitary facilities that are in proper operating condition, are private, and are adequate for personal cleanliness and the disposal of human waste.
- (7) Thermal environment. The shelter must have any necessary heating/cooling facilities in proper operating condition.
- (8) Illumination and electricity. The shelter must have adequate natural or artificial illumination to permit normal indoor activities and support health and safety. There must be sufficient electrical sources to permit the safe use of electrical appliances in the shelter.
- (9) Food preparation. Food preparation areas, if any, must contain suitable space and equipment to store, prepare, and serve food in a safe and sanitary manner.
- (10) Sanitary conditions. The shelter must be maintained in a sanitary condition.
- (11) Fire safety. There must be at least one working smoke detector in each occupied unit of the shelter. Where possible, smoke detectors must be located near sleeping areas. The fire alarm system must be designed for hearing-impaired residents. All public areas of the shelter must have at least one working smoke detector. There must also be a second means of exiting the building in the event of fire or other emergency.
- (c) Minimum standards for permanent housing. The recipient or subrecipient cannot use ESG funds to help a program participant remain or move into housing that does not meet the minimum habitability standards provided in this paragraph (c). The recipient may also establish standards that exceed or add to these minimum standards.
  - (1) Structure and materials. The structures must be structurally sound to protect residents from the elements and not pose any threat to the health and safety of the residents.
  - (2) Space and security. Each resident must be provided adequate space and security for themselves and their belongings. Each resident must be provided an acceptable place to sleep.
  - (3) Interior air quality. Each room or space must have a natural or mechanical means of ventilation. The interior air must be free of pollutants at a level that might threaten or harm the health of residents.
  - (4) Water supply. The water supply must be free from contamination.
  - (5) Sanitary facilities. Residents must have access to sufficient sanitary facilities that are in proper operating condition, are private, and are adequate for personal cleanliness and the disposal of human waste.
  - (6) Thermal environment. The housing must have any necessary heating/cooling facilities in proper operating condition.
  - (7) Illumination and electricity. The structure must have adequate natural or artificial illumination to permit normal indoor activities and support health and safety. There must be sufficient electrical sources to permit the safe use of electrical appliances in the structure.
  - (8) Food preparation. All food preparation areas must contain suitable space and equipment to store, prepare, and serve food in a safe and sanitary manner.
  - (9) Sanitary conditions. The housing must be maintained in a sanitary condition.
  - (10) Fire safety.

- (i) There must be a second means of exiting the building in the event of fire or other emergency.
- (ii) Each unit must include at least one battery-operated or hard-wired smoke detector, in proper working condition, on each occupied level of the unit. Smoke detectors must be located, to the extent practicable, in a hallway adjacent to a bedroom. If the unit is occupied by hearing impaired persons, smoke detectors must have an alarm system designed for hearing-impaired persons in each bedroom occupied by a hearing-impaired person.
- (iii) The public areas of all housing must be equipped with a sufficient number, but not less than one for each area, of battery-operated or hard-wired smoke detectors. Public areas include, but are not limited to, laundry rooms, community rooms, day care centers, hallways, stairwells, and other common areas.

This is the first year in many that the Township is receiving ESG funding and will be more involved in these efforts within the Township.

The Township, through CDBG Public Services funding has entered into Subrecipient Agreements with the Community Action Agency of Delaware County to assist the homeless or those at risk of becoming homeless.

Federal CDBG funding will be leveraged by applying for and using Liquid Fuels Funding for the roads program. The Township will apply for funding to Delaware County under the Affordable Housing Trust Fund which will used to leverage the CDBG funding for the Housing

ESG Match to be provided by Breaking Bread Community Shelter. Additionally, the Township intends to allocate ARPA funding to supplement the ESG funding provided to Breaking Bread for the emergency shelter. The Township also provides services at the Welcome Center out of local Township funds for ESL training, tenant/landlord issues and to promote Fair Housing.

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If appropriate, describe publically owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that may be used to address the needs identified in the plan

Public land will be used for Park Improvements in low/mod census tracts and block groups. Public roadways and ADA ramps will be improved to assist those in low/mod census tract and block groups and residents with special needs. Public Parking lots in low/mod census tracts and block groups will also be improved.

### Discussion

The Township reviewed and determined the most urgent current needs for funding this year in accordance with the Goals and Priority Needs outlined in the Consolidated Plan.

ESG funding is available for the first time in many years. Homelessness is an issue in the Township for a variety of reasons but a big one is the location of the 69th Street Transportation Terminal within the Township. While there is an existing Homeless Shelter within the Township that is operated by the Community Action Agency of Delaware County, which the Township provides CDBG funding to each Program Year to assist with the operation, there is still a great need for additional shelter and services. The ESG funding will be used to assist with the operation and renovation and expansion of a new Homeless shelter within the Township, Breaking Bread Communit Shelter, which is also receiving funding from Delaware County, the State and Township ARPA funds.

### AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities - 91.220(i) Introduction

Upper Darby has not received ESG funding in many years. This is the first year to be receiving it in a long time. The Township has provided funding through a Subrecipient Agreement to the Delaware County Community Action Agency for operation and services at the Eastern Delaware County Homeless Shelter, who provides overnight shelter, meals, life skill training and outreach.

With the ESG funding this year the Township plans to provide funding through a Subrecipient Agreement to Breaking Bread Community Services shelter on Long Lane in Upper Darby. Breaking Bread intends to utilize this funding to perform renovations to expand the number of beds that they currently have available.

Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

Outreach will be done by the Delaware County Community Action Agency and Breaking Bread Community Services

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

Transitional Housing is provided at the County level. The Township will fund the Delaware County Community Action Agency for shelter operations and with ESG funding Breaking Bread Community Services to assist them in expanding their ability to provide shelter and other services.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

This is primarily done at the County level through the Department of Human Services.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving 31

assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

This is primarily done at the County level through the Department of Human Services.

### Discussion

Upper Darby will be receiving ESG funding for the first time in many years which will enable them to perform more services and provide more assistance through their partners to those in need. As noted above, the majority of services are already available through the County. Their new No Wrong Door program provides a 24 hour hotline and a variety of social service options, referrals will be made as needs become known to the Township (see attached).

### AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing – 91.220(j)

### Introduction:

The biggest barrier to affordable housing is cost. Rents and the sale price for homes has skyrocketed in recent years. Income has not kept up with those increased costs. Recent published studies have shown that rental costs have increased by 14%-21% in the Philadelphia Metropolitan area. Vacancy rates have decreased from 6.3% to 4.2% making finding affordable housing very difficult. The cost to purchase a home has also dramatically increased in recent years, creating bidding wars that raise the price of homes even higher. The Township continues to fund the FTHB Program to assist those who want to purchase their first home within Upper Darby Township.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

There are currently no local public policies that create barriers to affordable housing. The State of Pennsylvania policy of paying for schools through property taxes creates a great burden to low-income households. This policy was recently found to be illegal by the courts, however, a new policy has not yet been created.

### AP-85 Other Actions - 91.220(k)

### Introduction:

The greatest obstacle is the lack of funding and the rising costs of all commodities, including food, fuel and construction materials as well as the rising cost of housing. Incomes have not increased to meet these rising costs.

The Township will spend their CDBG & ESG funding to assist low and low/mod residents either through area benefit, direct benefit, or public service activities. Homeless assistance will also be provided both through CDBG funding and ESG.

### Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

The Township is working with local non-profits to serve those in need, by providing funding for a food pantry, to assist those suffering from domestic violence, to provide funding to high low/mod areas for neighboorhood safety issues as an example. The full list of projects in included in the Plan. CDBG & ESG funding will be provided to assist the homeless.

### Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

The Township will continue to fund the Housing Rehabilitation Program to keep low and low/mod homeowners safely and affordably in their homes and the First Time Homebuyer Down Payment Assistance Program to provide down payment and closing cost assistance to low and low/mod first time buyers who are purchasing their first home in the Township.

### Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

Every full Housing Rehabilitation project (not priority/emergency jobs) will undergo a full XRF test and Risk Assessment. If lead-based paint is found, it is remediated by a licenses lead contractor and a post abatement inspection and clearance is completed.

A Visual Paint Inspection is completed on every home in the First Time Homebuyer Downpayment Program by a certified tester.

Every household in both programs is provided with a copy of the EPA Lead Hazard pamphlet.

### Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

The Township continues to work with local businesses to ensure that jobs are available locally and to attract new businesses into the Township. The Township will provide copies of the County No Wrong Door information as it becomes aware of specific needs.

### Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The Township is currently reviewing their current Community Development staffing situation and will make decisions regarding expanding the current staffing levels.

### Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The Township is in ongoing communication with Delaware County, and local non-profits, as well as the Delaware County Community Action Agency and Breaking Bread. Upper Darby staff is actively involved with the Delaware County Working Housing Group to coordinate needs and potential solutions to those needs.

### Discussion:

As discussed elsewhere, the continued rising costs of housing, food and fuel is putting a great burden on low and low/mod income individuals and household.

### Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Reference 91.220(I)(4)

Since this is the first year in many that the Township is receiving ESG funding, we are in the process of developing written standards and procedures the first Draft of those Guidelines is attached but will likely be revised and expanded upon. This will be fully completed prior to entering into a Subrecipient Agreement with Breaking Bread. This program year, the funding will be used for construction and the guidelines and procedures will be developed to address all Federal Requirements which must be adhered to for construction projects, including Davis Bacon wage rates and Section 3 regulations.

2. If the Continuum of Care has established centralized or coordinated assessment system that meets HUD requirements, describe that centralized or coordinated assessment system.

Breaking Bread will use HMIS as the coordinated entry system.

3. Identify the process for making sub-awards and describe how the ESG allocation available to private nonprofit organizations (including community and faith-based organizations).

An assessment was undertaken to determine the best use of the ESG funds this year. It was determined that the most pressing need was to provide additional assistance to the growing homeless population. Breaking Bread has just recently opened a new Homeless shelter within the Township and is rapidly outgrowing the current structure, therefore, a determination was made that the best use of ESG funds was to assist them in expanding their current shelter.

4. If the jurisdiction is unable to meet the homeless participation requirement in 24 CFR 576.405(a), the jurisdiction must specify its plan for reaching out to and consulting with homeless or formerly homeless individuals in considering policies and funding decisions regarding facilities and services funded under ESG.

Homeless outreach is done by both the CAADC and Breaking Bread. Breaking Bread found that there was a need to allow the homeless who have pets to use the shelter, since refusal to allow pets keeps some homeless on the streets. They adopted a policy to allow pets. Fear of police reporting,

or immigration issues were also an issue that Breaking Bread found to be an obstacle to seeking housing and services in the homeless population so they also adoped policies to address that issue.

5. Describe performance standards for evaluating ESG.

Since this is the first year that the Township is receiving ESG funding and the first year that Breaking Bread witll be receiving Township funding, we will work with them on a regular basis to ensure that they are meeting all Federal requirements, especially for construction since that is how they intend to use the funding, but also to evaluate their service to the community. Due to the nature of the construction the shelter will need to be closed while the renovations take place. Breaking Bread has determined that the best time to do this would be after the winter when housing will be needed. We will work closely with them throught and after the process.

All funds will be utilized in accordance with the regulations to assist the low and low/mod population of the Township and to assist the homeless.
